From the Pastor's Desk

Understanding and Applying the Word

A few weeks ago I did a message from Colossians 1 where I mentioned this short passage had so many unique phrases we would not fully engage them all. Lets just take Colossians 1:10 for instance: "So as to walk in a manner worthy of the Lord, fully pleasing to him: bearing fruit in every good work and increasing in the knowledge of God;"

As soon as we read "so as" we need to ask where is that coming from. There are numerous thoughts we can gain from verse 9 but for now lets just know that Paul is praying for the believers to know God's will for them. So, when I know God's will, this becomes a motivation for my pattern of life. That has likely happened for you many times. You are reading a scripture, such as one of God's promises to never leave you or forsake you, and your response is to worship him and to love him more for this commitment to you. Perhaps you remembered some times when you were struggling with life and God moved to show his presence and care for you. Didn't you find that this prompted you to look at your present life and make choices to "walk more in a manner worthy of the Lord"?

Now think about this truth a little further. How do we come to know God's will? That is primarily from knowing more of God's word. We might do this with our personal time to read/study the word for ourselves. We join Life Groups and Bible Study groups to learn together with other believers and we attend Church services to teach us more truth about God. Each of these experiences show us how much God has done to redeem us and work good in our lives that we are encouraged and even motivated to make choices to be "worthy of the Lord".

Do you see you could spend additional time meditating on how this blessing works in your life. Perhaps noting particular times when learning a truth about God has helped you make wise choices to obey him. You may have discovered that keeping a notebook or journal is helpful in remembering this experiences with God and his word.

We also note in this verse that seeking to live our life to be worthy of the Lord brings us to a place where we are "bearing fruit in every good work". Now bearing fruit might be many things but first of all we recognize that this is a very good thing. We all love feeling like life is purposeful, beneficial and positively making a difference for ourselves and others. Think about some times when you felt particularly great about how your life was going. For me many of those have come from making choices to obey God and then see the fruit-fulness of those choices. Sometimes God blesses us to see the fruit quite quickly and that is so encouraging. The challenge is to learn from these quick blessings to trust that when I make the right choice to obey God that he is causing fruitfulness even when I don't see it immediately.

Spend some of your time in the Word letting the Word find its way into your heart. Ponder what the words actually mean for your daily choices. Invite the Spirit to help you understand more of who our God is and how this can guide your daily decisions.

Missions Moment—Operation Christmas Child



It's that time again! Yes, it is true, Christmas is right around the corner, and this October and November the Little White Church and our KidzLife

program are sponsoring a Christmas shoebox drive on behalf of Operation Christmas Child a ministry of Samaritan's Purse with the mission to provide local partners around the world with shoeboxes filled with small toys, hygiene items, and school supplies as a means of reaching out to children in their own communities with

the Good News of Jesus Christ. They ship these simple gifts outside the United States to children affected by war, poverty, natural disaster, famine, and disease; and to children living on Native American reservations in the U.S.

For more years than I can remember, the Little White Church has sponsored a shoe box drive and the last six or so years have been record numbers for us. On occasion, someone has taken a pie in the face when we've gone over the 100 mark. This might be a good initiation event for Pastor Nathan or Pastor Chuck. You decide.

The last Sunday of October and first two Sundays of November we will watch short videos of God's work through the shoebox ministry. The KidzLife program will also pack boxes on a Wednesday afternoon yet to be determined. For the Little White Church, we ask for complete boxes and a donation of \$10/box for shipping; however, KidzLife is receiving individual items to pack in their boxes. We will have boxes, donation envelopes and other items at our display table in the Fellowship Hall.

Collection will take place the week of November 18-25. Bring your filled box (s) and your \$10 donation for shipping and handling to the church during that week. I will take all the boxes down to the Rapid City drop-off site on Sunday, November 24 after our service. If you miss the 14th, you can always run yours down to Real Life Church on Sheridan RD on Monday, November 25.

Ministry Moment—Celebrate Recovery

Celebrate Recovery is a bible based, Christ centered program. Like a lot of recovery groups, it is a 12 Step program. Celebrate Recovery also has 8 Principles based on the Beatitudes in Matthew 5. At CR, we name our higher power...Jesus Christ. The first things people think of when they hear the word "recovery" are usually durgs and alcohol. Did you know that only 1 in 3 people who attend CR are there because of a chemical addiction problem? Recovery is about so much more than just those two issues.

At Celebrate Recovery we talk about hurts, habits and hang-ups.. A hurt is an emotional reaction to a situation or circumstance that has affected our ability to deal with the world in a healthy way. It's usually something that has twisted our view of ourselves, God and/or others. A habit is an unhealthy pattern that developes because of the hurt we have experienced. We often use this as an escape from the hurt/pain we have experienced. It can turn into a chronic bad habit such as drugs, alcohol, gambling, shopping, food, pornography/sex, cutting, etc. A hang-up is a negative menal attitude used to cope with people or life's struggles such as anger, depression, fear, unforgiveness, control and co-dependency.

There is no denying that life is hard. Relationships are hard. Celebrate Recovery is for everyone because we all have something that we are dealing with. We live in a fallen, broken world. We all struggle. No matter what your hurt, habit or hang-up is, you are not alone! Celebrate Recovery is a confidential and safe place to heal.

Celebrate Recovery meets every Tuesday night at the Little White Church. We serve dinner at 5:45. We begin large group at 6:30 in the sanctuary. This is where we all gather to begin the night with worship music to set our hearts and minds on Jesus. Next we move into either a lesson based on the 12 Steps and corresponding principle or a testimony from someone who has found freedom in Christ through the CR program. These alternate every week. After the lesson or testimony, we recite the Serenity Prayer (see it in it's entirety below) and then break into small groups. The women meet in one area and the men meet in a separate area. This allows for a safe environment to openly share with our sisters or brothers what is on our hearts.

Celebrate Recovery also offers an in depth "step study" which goes into detail for each of the 12 Steps and 8 Principles. This is also gender specific. It is where we dig deep and begin to heal those old hurts with the help of Jesus Christ. It is truly a life changing study if you allow God access to your deepest hurts so that He can begin to heal your broken heart and replace the lies that we believe with the truth.

Ministry Moment—Celebrate Recovery

We invite each of you to join us at CR! We offer Celebration Place for the younger children who learn the same thing the adults do only geared towards them. In the past, we have offered The Landing for the teens on Wednesday nights in conjunction with Youth night. Again, it is a safe place for our kiddos to meet and talk about what's going on with them and teaches them biblically based solutions to those hurts, habits and hang-ups. Our children are hurting...yes, even yours! We are hoping to reinstate The Landing either on Wednesday nights or on our CR night. (Young adult and/or adult volunteers willing to help would be greatly appreciated). Celebrate Recovery is truly for the entire family! We are a tight group and we refer to each other as forever family. Don't get caught up in the lie that you don't need recovery because you don't drink or do drugs. We truly believe everyone...and our church....would benefit from working this program. We won't lie....it is hard to take a look at our lives and to make changes! But with God, amazing things can and do happen! Just talk to any one of us in the program and we will happily tell you what God has done in our lives. While CR is a confidential program, many of us live our recovery boldly and loudly. Not everyone is at that place yet, but those of us who are can tell you that while recovery is hard, it's worth it! YOU are worth it!

We know it's hard to step forward and ask for help. We each had to do it. We will listen, we will welcome you into our family and we will love you unconditionally. We are grateful to the Pastors and Elders of the Little White Church for supporting this life changing program!

Will you take a minute and recite the Serenity prayer out loud?

God, grant me the serenity to accept the things I cannot change, the courage to change the things I can and the wisdom to know the difference. Living one day at a time, enjoying one moment at a time, accepting hardship as the pathway to peace; Taking as Jesus did, this sinful world as it is, not as I would have it. Trusting that you will make all things right if I surrender to your will. So that I may be reasonably happy in this life and supremely happy with you forever in the next. AMEN!

A PRAYER FOR DIRECTION

Lord what do You want me to do?
ACTS 9:6

Some of the most informative and instructive prayers are those shot like arrows from hearts that are desperate. Paul, who almost single-handedly took the gospel to the far reaches of the known world and left us half of our New Testament through his writings, was not always a dynamo of a Christian leader. Originally known as Saul, he began as the very antithesis of what we know of him today. As a "Jew of Jews" he saw the new Jesus movement as a threat to all he had known and sought to preserve. He became the point person assigned with putting down the exploding phenomenon. In Acts 8, his terrorist cell, operating in Jerusalem, had successfully eliminated Stephen, the first Christian martyr. He was engaged in a high-intensity campaign of intimidation and murder to crush this new and expanding church movement.

While enroute to Damascus to stamp out a Christian uprising there, something happened that forever transformed him. "Suddenly a light shone around him from heaven. Then he fell to the ground, and heard a voice saying to him, 'Saul, Saul, why are you persecuting Me?'" (Acts 9:3-4). It was none other than the risen Christ miraculously appearing to him. Then, "trembling and astonished" he asked, "Lord, what do You want me to do?" (v6). This became the burning desire of his life – to know God's direction and do what pleased the Lord. Whether experiencing his shipwreck at Malta, being stoned and left for dead at Lystra, suffering beatings and imprisonment in Philippi, and finally being beheaded outside the city gates of Rome, this prayer, "Lord, what to You want me to do?" became the driving motivation of his life.

This question is the prayer every believer should be consistently asking: "Lord, what do You want me to do?" Somewhere there is something for you to do that no one else can do quite like you can do. There is a purpose for your life that, according to Jeremiah, existed even before you took your first breath. Through the prophet's pen God framed it, "Before I formed you in the womb I knew you; before you were born I sanctified you; I ordained you a prophet to the nations" (Jeremiah 1:5). Like Jeremiah and Paul, you too have a God-given purpose that should move you to pray, "Lord, what do You want me to do?"

Putting this question into practice in our own experience will require asking two questions: *Who?* and *What?* The first question to ask ourselves is, "Who?" Note the order of the personal pronouns in Paul's question. *You* comes before *me!* Too many of us pray something to this effect: "Lord, here are my marching orders for You today. Bless me; take care of my family; meet this need for me; straighten out this other person." This results in a "What have you done for me lately?" attitude. But a new day will dawn on your Christian experience when you put Christ first and begin each day praying, "Lord, what do *You* want *me* to do today?"

Remember this truth – He knows you . . . always has . . . always will . . . everything about you. He did not simply know you were in the womb. There is nothing remarkable about that. Anyone could have concluded that along the way of your mother's pregnancy. But God knew you even before you were conceived. You are no accident. No one on this planet has a fingerprint or DNA like yours. God has a specific, tailor-made design for your life. If this is true, who of us would want to find that kind of direction in life? And who of us would not want to pray, "Lord, what do You want me to do?" The "who" is important. It is not about you; it is all about Him. It is not about what you want to do, but it is all about what God wants you to do that matters most in life.

Next comes the question of "what?" Paul asked, "What do You want me to do?" The answer comes in realizing that God did not simply know you before you were born, but He set you apart and has a job for you to do that no one else can do as well as you can. Just as God "ordained" Jeremiah and Paul to a specific task, He has uniquely assigned you a specific assignment. This word we translate "ordained" is from the Old Testament word that means "to assign; to designate." Interestingly, the same word is used in the first chapter of the Bible when we read how God "set [the stars] in the firmament" (Genesis 1:17). Each one of the million stars has its own appointed place set by God, and they all move in clocklike precision. Just as God has set and assigned each single star, He has assigned each and every one of us a job to do. True success in life comes not in simply knowing what God's plan is for us but in doing it.

Make this prayer of Paul's your daily prayer. When you do, you just might find it as life-transforming as he did. Go ahead – pray it now: "Lord what do *You* want *me* to *do*?" And when you pray like this, you have the promise of God: "You will show me the path of life; in Your presence is fullness of joy; at Your right hand are pleasures forevermore" (Psalm 16:11).

Of all these new events, one of my favorites is **Name Tag Sunday**. Starting a conversation with someone you don't know can be really hard. For some people, it can be downright terrifying. But this small, simple act tears down the biggest, most obvious barrier to connection (*ironically*, *it also* seems to be the most **overlooked** barrier) . . . our name.

For that one Sunday, our name is right there on our shirt — available for anyone to easily read. Suddenly, it is WAY easier to walk up to someone new and start a conversation. The taboo created by that barrier is gone. Virtually **everyone** is a little bit more comfortable talking to a "stranger", because they're all wearing a name tag. The name tag, itself, creates an ice breaker to get the discussion rolling.

And, in the process of that interaction, you find yourself glancing at the name tag several times . . . making a mental note of that person's name. The result? Your chances of remembering that person improve a LOT! When you see them the next Sunday, you're more likely to walk up to them and say, "Hi!". Because that person isn't a stranger anymore.

Wouldn't it be nice if we all became so fond of **Name Tag Sunday**, that names became more important to us? Can you imagine what might happen? The more names we learned – or heard – the fewer people we would encounter that felt like strangers to us. The desire to share your name would begin to show up in other ways:

- The person doing announcements would remember that not everyone in that sanctuary knows who he or she is. It might go like this: "Good morning! I'm Bonnie Reese. We have a lot to tell you about this morning"; or,
- The person sharing info about an upcoming event hosted by their small group or ministry would make **sure** we all know who they are. For instance: "My name is Bonnie Reese. On the 21st of September, All That I Am Today will be presenting the final seminar in our "A Gathering of Hearts" series. Attendance is free. Details are on the flyer in your bulletin."

Names would become a habit, any time you find yourself speaking to an individual --- or a group --- with whom you are not well acquainted. Whatever the scenario, wouldn't it be great if we all remembered that "invisible name tag"?

Dear parents, grandparents, & caring adults,






